One of the responsibilities of Police & Crime Commissioners (PCCs) is to set the budget for policing. A small proportion of the cost of policing comes from your council tax, with the rest coming directly from government.

I recently consulted with the public to see whether they would be prepared to pay more to fund over 100 additional officers and specialist staff. The majority of respondents told me they supported an increase in the police precept and, as a result, the police portion of your council tax will increase by £5 per year for a Band D household, raising a further £3 million in 2017/18.

The increase will support extra officers and staff in key areas described in this leaflet and, as a result, will strengthen local policing.

Strengthening local policing

Community Investigation Teams: Around 24 more officers

Local policing is adapting to match changes in crime, becoming increasingly evidence-based, intelligenceled and focused on vulnerability.

Dedicated Community Investigation Teams will proactively intervene to disrupt local crime groups, seeking to take these offenders off our streets. The new teams will provide additional resources to crack down on these small groups and individuals whose criminal activity feeds the anti-social behaviour which affects our communities. They will also concentrate on known organised crime gangs involved in drug dealing and work alongside our Integrated Offender Management teams and services to reduce re-offending.

Expert Youth Teams: Up to 20 more police officers Early intervention is proven to help steer young people away from crime. Working across the agencies that interact with them means there are more opportunities to spot when the most susceptible are in danger of crossing the line.

This year's additional funding will provide a dedicated team of police officers and staff who will work directly with schools, colleges and universities, focusing on prevention advice and interventions, supporting the vulnerable and those most at risk, and dealing firmly and quickly with incidents.



Strengthening local policing

Armed Response Officers: 52 more officers

After the terrorist attacks in Europe over the last year and with the UK threat level at 'severe', PCCs and Chief Constables in the South East region have been planning how best to prepare and respond to possible attacks in our communities. It is important that people can be reassured that in Sussex we have enough armed officers and equipment.

Extra funding will result in 52 more Armed Response Officers and three new specialist vehicles will be added across Surrey and Sussex. When they are not being deployed or in training, armed officers already support local policing teams so an uplift of 52 officers will be a welcome addition to visible policing.

Public Protection Investigators: 30 more officers

In previous precept consultations I have asked the public for additional resources in Sussex Police's Public Protection capacity.

Although this has increased the number of officers and staff, Sussex still spends less per head of population

than similar-sized forces at a time when these types of crime continue to rise. Police are dealing with more cases as a consequence of the public's increased confidence in how reports of rape, serious sexual offences and offences against children are managed.


